Ashburn Polwarths, Carrick, TAS topped the Medium Merino wool sales on 25th March with 1050 cents.



Willawa - Flock no. 406 by Kaye Potter

In early February, Greg and I had the pleasure of visiting Willawa located near Carramut, VIC. These days, fourth generation brothers Tim and Greg King work together to manage the flock of 5000 Polwarths and 1000 head of Poll Hereford cattle.

Willawa was originally part of 'Lawrenny Station', a property 12,700 acres in size owned by the McArthur family. Tim and Greg's great uncles on their great grandmother's side purchased 3200 acres of Lawrenny in 1904. They named their new property Willawa, an Aboriginal word meaning 'to rest here'.

In 1923, Tim and Greg's grandfather, Keith King returned from Perth to take over Willawa from his aging great uncles. He mar-



Peter's father retired in 1963 and handed the reins to his son. Peter and Joy bought up four children at Willawa including Tim, Greg, Jeremy and sister. As young men, both Tim and Greg attended Glenormiston Agricultural College to complete a two-year course in Farm Management.

Willawa was registered with the Polwarth Sheep Breeders Association of Australia in 1960 as flock number 406 with the purchase of the Barna stud, flock number 38 from Ellerslie, Victoria. At time of registration the flock had 61 ewes.

However, Tim recounts stories of Polwarths on Willawa much earlier than 1960. He can remember his grandfather/father telling him about the truck load of ewes purchased from the Dennis family in 1937.

In 1982 tragedy struck the family. Greg, Tim and Jeremy had gone down the road on their private tanker to help fight a grass fire. Greg was driving and Tim and Jeremy were on the back. Jeremy, a bad asthmatic had taken a Ventolin inhaler at the encouragement of his mother. Sadly, the extreme heat caused the inhaler to explode killing Jeremy (aged 20) and leaving Tim with burns to 30% of his body. It took many many months for Tim to recuperate from his injuries. He remained at home to help his father while in 1986, Greg went to Melbourne for work.

Peter King passed away in 2013 aged 83 years and his wife Joy died in 2019. It was at this time that Greg returned to Willawa to work in partnership with Tim. Willawa's fifth generation is in the making. Greg's twin boys currently aged 15 years take a keen interest in the farm's activities. Although Greg wants them to finish school, go to university and experience some of life first, it is reassuring to Tim and Greg to have the boys in the wings.
