

Post flood update from Moorabbee

Apart from the low lying areas, things have pretty well dried out and I'm now able to access most parts of the farm. There is plenty of feed and amazingly, the clover is still green as we approach mid December.

The flood was fierce, leaving minimal debris lying in the paddocks. There is a bit of debris up against fences but most of it has gone over the top. Jokingly, "I suspect the debris has arrived at Kangaroo Island by now and I will send an account for firewood delivered to some people I know there!"

Fencing is the go at the moment with a combination of propping up, repairing and replacing short sections of 40-120 metres. I have a contractor booked for the new year to replace an 800m section of fencing.

The mosquitos are prolific! Lifting up debris from the downed fences results in a multitude of mozzies fiercely attacking you.

The farm/sheep schedule is running 4 to 6 weeks behind normal. Managed to finish shearing two weeks ago. Sold the first draft of White Suffolk X lambs two weeks ago for a most respectable \$203. The cull ewes are off to market this afternoon.

The wheat crop will not be harvested until mid January as some parts of the crop were under water for weeks, however remarkably, the majority looks okay.

With only one paddock available for 4-5 weeks, I had to put the ewes and freshly weaned lambs back together again which they were most appreciative of.

I usually join early December, however the lack of paddocks has limited me to joining 40 Polwarth hogget ewes and 100 White Suffolk X ewes.

Two paddocks of wheaten stubble will become available mid to late January which will give me more options for joining the remainder of the Polwarth ewes.

In summary, Moorabbee faired much better than neighbours who lost cows and calves. Repairing the fencing is good exercise—well that's what I keep telling myself.

MLA — Genoptyping Project

This year, a number of Polwarth breeders were invited to participate in a Meat and Livestock Australia (MLA) genotyping project conducted in conjunction with the University of New England, NSW.

The project, sponsored by MLA seeks to genotype breeds with insufficient reference populations. Foundation breeds of popular composites have been targeted for sample collection including, Polwarth, Romney, Finn, Aussie White, Cheviot, English Leicester, Perendale, East Friesian, Prime SAMM, Damara, Lincoln, Van Rooy, Rambouillet and Wiltshire Horn breeds.

I'm delighted to say that the project had an excellent response from Polwarth breeders who were required to select animals from a range of bloodlines within their flock. Breeders were supplied with equipment to take ear tissue samples from selected animals which were then returned to UNE for processing.

While not guaranteed at the moment, we are hoping that participation in this project may lead to ASBV's (Australian Sheep Breeding Values) for Polwarths, or indeed, other research and development which could benefit our breed.





ASWS - International Judges in 2023

We are delighted to announce that our judges for the Australian Sheep and Wool Show to be held in Bendigo, VIC from 14-16 July will be Joaquin and Fernando Martinicorena from Uruguay.

We last saw Joaquin and Fernando in 2019 where they were special guests at our Centenary celebration afternoon tea.

It would be great to have as much support as possible from breeders, be it in the show ring, or the fleece competition.

Adelaide Show—Polwarth Feature Breed










Narang $\,$ - thank you to Peter and Caroline in the Adelaide Hills, SA
